




What We Know







60% reduction in alcohol, cigarette and marijuana use 3 years later for students whose teachers taught at least 60% of the curriculum





Path Analysis

- Individual/peer favorable attitudes toward drug use
- Individual/peer perceived risks for drug use
- Individual/peer intentions to use drugs
- Peer use of drugs
- Parental favorable attitudes toward drug use
- Family management





Criteria For Second Tier Programs

- Programs on NREPP
- Experimental Designs (RCT or QED)
- Overall Quality of Research and dissemination 3.0 or higher



Second Tier Program List

- WSU and SDRG review and Recommendations
- Extensive NREPP search and Coding
- Blueprints Database







Final Criteria for Recommendations

- 1. Already demonstrated marijuana outcomes; aligned with WSIPP
- 2. Addresses earlier developmental risk and protective factors
 Separate out programs that focus on older age populations
- 3. Demonstrate outcomes on multiple risk factors, especially attitudes/intentions
- 4. Consistent with Blueprints criteria; include more than pre-post
- 5. No iatrogenic effects related to marijuana use
- 6. Independently evaluated rather than part of a booster or system
- 7. Stay marijuana focused (rather than tobacco or alcohol only programs) SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT RESEARCH GROUP
