What is this study about?

Purpose: Understand clinician beliefs and behaviors related cannabis adverse events to inform future clinician education and training, and to identify opportunities for implementing clinical interventions. Your participation will provide nurses' perspective to the study.

Eligibility: All nurses licensed and working in the state of Washington, who have direct contact with patients in WA State are eligible to participate in this study. Please read this information page to learn more about the project.

Emergency Nurses Play a Vital Role: According to various studies, emergency care settings are the most frequent sought services for people who experience cannabis- induced adverse effects. For this reason, we are very interested on emergency nurses' perspectives.

What will you be asked to do?

If you decide to participate in this study, we will ask you to take a brief survey about your knowledge, beliefs, clinical practices, and interest in intervening on cannabis adverse events and personal and institutional barriers for addressing cannabis adverse events.

This online survey will take approximately 15 minutes to complete. You will receive a \$35 gift card by email within 5-7 business days after you complete the survey.

Please complete the survey in a private space where other people won't be able to see your answers.

How will we protect the information you provide?

We will protect your confidentiality. We will store the data with a code instead of your email address. We will keep a list that links the code to your email and will store it securely and separate from the data.

Other information about this study.

Being in this study is voluntary. This means that you can stop the survey at any time.

We are receiving funding from the Washington State Legislature through ESSB 5187 (2023) and by the Washington State Dedicated Cannabis Fund for research at the University of Washington.

The University of Washington Human Subjects Division (HSD) has determined that this study is exempt from IRB review.

How will research findings be disseminated?

The results of this research will be published in an academic journal and will be shared with the purpose of education and awareness for community stakeholders (e.g., policy makers, Healthcare Authority, Washington State Department of Health), public health and healthcare professionals. Findings may also be used to develop, test and implement clinical interventions that can prevent or reduce the severity of adverse effects caused by cannabis consumption.
