### Tips for selecting non-stigmatizing images

- 1. Watch out for misinformation: Make sure images don't spread false ideas about drug use.
- **2. Avoid triggering images:** Stay away from pictures of drugs or drug supplies unless you need them to explain something specific. Instead, consider neutral images (ex. a dictionary page).
- **3. Show different kinds of people:** Use images of people from different races, genders, ages, etc. to represent people who use drugs and those who help them.
- **4. Keep it positive and simple:** Avoid dramatic, sad-looking, or dark and scary images. Show everyday people in normal, supportive situations.
- **5. Make it humanizing:** Avoid pictures where a person's face is hidden with only their drugs in focus. Instead, use images that show them as full people, not just as drug users.
