Marijuana Source Assessment Matrix: What Do We Want to Know About Marijuana Access?

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The Washington State Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery (DBHR) requested a review of how national, state, and other surveys ask about the sources of marijuana acquired/consumed by youth and adult marijuana users. It is presented in a matrix summarizing how different surveys approach the issue and the implications of those differences. In addition, DBHR was interested in ADAI's recommendation on how to ask about source of marijuana and—if recommendations would differ by age—how to ask of youth, young adults, and adults, particularly what response options to include to get at important distinctions, while keeping the number of response options reasonable. Below is a matrix representing a number of ways source of marijuana has been assessed in surveys of youth and adults in the last 5+ years.

Commentary and General Recommendations

Surveys of marijuana use sometimes ask about access, particularly how easy or difficult it is for individuals to procure marijuana, the sources from which they procure it, and other aspects of marijuana sourcing. There is considerable variability from survey to survey in the construction of items to assess source of marijuana, with no gold standards for either question stems or answer choices. As shown in the above examples, questions tend to conflate *from whom, where,* and *how* individuals obtain marijuana with the *context* in which they use marijuana. It is unclear how respondents approach such questions when multiple answer choices fit for a single incident (e.g., respondent gave money to a friend at a party to get it from a medical marijuana cardholder). Questions do not differentiate primary sources from infrequent sources.

In deciding what existing items to choose or whether and how to rework items to assess source of marijuana, it comes down to what exactly do we want to know? How will the information serve us? For example, is it important to differentiate between friend and family sources? Will that knowledge affect intervention development? Considering that "I got it at a party" could mean 1) someone was passing around a joint and they partook of it or 2) they had prearranged to procure a quantity of marijuana at the party to take home, is such a difference important for our purposes?

Different ways of constructing items and answer choices will have different benefits and drawbacks, so it becomes a matter of priorities and tradeoffs. How important is it to compare from year to year? If comparisons over time from year to year are important, question wording should not be changed at all or changed only minimally. NSDUH uses a strategy of phasing new questions in, so that old questions can be directly compared with new questions within years before dropping old questions. If year-to-year comparisons are not critical, important considerations for item and answer choice construction are listed below.

Are we interested in the respondent's experience/behavior or the respondent's perception of climate/peers? This should be made explicit in the question. Focusing on respondents' personal experience/behavior limits the sample for source questions to marijuana users only, which is a much smaller sample. This may increase the reliability of the answers because it removes the speculative aspect that querying non-users involves. Other possibilities include constructing an item in which those who have used marijuana are instructed to answer about their own personal experience while those who have not are instructed to answer about their peers, or constructing two items: one that everyone gets that asks about climate/peers and one that only users get that asks about personal experience. Focusing on climate/peers allows asking non-marijuana users their perceptions of peer access, which may be well-informed or ill-informed. To gauge how informed non-using respondents are, it would be helpful to assess their perception of what proportion of their peer group uses marijuana.

If actual source among users is of interest, the timeframe should be made clear in the question. Are we interested in capturing all of the sources they have used, the usual source, or the most recent source? In any case, answer choices should be mutually exclusive so that respondents are not confused about which answer fits the best. When answer choices are not mutually exclusive, respondents will often just select the first one that fits. Source should be defined as a person OR a place OR a situation, etc. If source is more than one of these things, there should be more than one question about source.

Specific Recommendations

Questions for Adults

The NSDUH items are among the best constructed items psychometrically and enable comparison to a national sample of individuals aged 12 and above. For adults, a subset of the NSDUH questions, supplemented with content similar to what is assessed in the RAND questions, would provide a good picture of marijuana use in Washington. Although the interest is in source, asking about month/year and what product(s) helps to contextualize source information and stimulate respondent's memory.

- During the past 12 months, that is, since [DATEFILL], did you buy any marijuana?
- During the past 12 months, that is, since [DATEFILL], did you trade something for marijuana?
- During the past 12 months, that is, since [DATEFILL], did you get marijuana for free?

Questions for Youth
