

What is Community Drug Checking?

Drug checking:

- Allows people to identify contents within a substance and make informed decisions
- Is paired with other person-centered health services, including:
 - Syringe services programs, wound care, HIV & Hep C Testing and Treatment, medications for opioid use disorder (MOUD, and overdose prevention sites
- Allows the community to identify new emerging drug threats, such as contaminants like xylazine





How Do We Check Drugs?

Test Strips

- Single drug: fentanyl, benzodiazepines (ex. Xanax, bromazolam), xylazine (new!)
- YES/NO
- Highly sensitive
- False positives with some substances






Spectrometers (Fancy Science Machines)

FTIR (fourier-transform infrared)

- Shoots a beam of infrared light through the sample and gives a reading to compare with vast libraries of substances
- Can be set up anywhere
- Training is extensive but no background in chemistry required
- Detection limit about 5%

GC-MS (gas chromatography mass spectrometry)

- Lab based testing scientist required
- Can detect trace amounts







Why Do We Check Drugs?

Knowledge is power!


- When people know what's in their drugs, they are more likely to take safety precautions like using with a friend or using less.
- Drug checking is an evidence-based strategy to prevent overdose.
- Offering drug checking **connects people to other health services**, like HIV testing, naloxone, medications for opioid use disorder, etc.
- Knowledge of local drug supply and emerging trends **allows for swift and targeted response** efforts.

Starting Out


- Received machine in late January
- In person training component
- Began testing samples last few days of January
- 1:1 Training component
- Confirmatory testing support
- Relationship building has been the key
- Barriers include a shifting legal landscape & sense of safety for participants
- Figuring out safe storage options for samples & avoiding transporting samples

Community Drug Checking

These are the most recent results from our local FTIR machine, Speck! Come check it out at our 1903 E Isaacs Avenue location in Walla Walla.

We have tested:

- 126 samples from 58 participants
- 83 in Walla Walla
- 30 in Kennewick
- 14 in Clarkston

2 samples in Walla Walla & 1 sample in Kennewick have included xylazine, aka tranq. Keep an eye out for wounds and come see one of our nurses!

- Clarkston, WA (population 7194)
 - Mondays 1pm-3:30pm
 - Idaho factors
 - Visibility in a small town







Drug Checking Hours & Locations

- Walla Walla, WA (population 33,927)
 - Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays 8:30am-12pm & 1:00pm-4:30pm
 - Broader walk in hours, stronger relationships,
 & less fear-based urgency
 - Dropbox installed recently to collect samples when technician is away
 - Co-located services







Drug Checking Hours & Locations

- Kennewick, WA (population 84,488)
 - Fridays 12pm-4pm
 - Scant resources in this area despite highest population; high need for wound care
 - Most skepticism of this approach







Xylazine

- 2 samples confirmed so far
- 1 sample awaiting confirmatory test
- Immediacy of wraparound services





Current Status of Drug Checking in WA

- 7 locations conducting drug checking in WA State
 - They will notify community partners when ready to accept referrals
- Among 325 samples collected in WA State from 12/2022-5/2023 that had confirmation testing:
 - 42% of all samples (n=135) tested positive for methamphetamine.
 - 85% had no other major substance detected.
 - 29% of all samples (n=95) tested positive for fentanyl of which 60% also had acetaminophen or similar drugs present.
 - 2 samples tested positive for xylazine (only xylazine positive results to date).





Current Status of Drug Checking in WA

- Many other substances were also detected
 - Not possible to determine if drug combinations were sold mixed together, mixed later purposefully, or unintentionally cross-contaminated.
- Additional analyses will be conducted and shared in the coming months
 - Describing the drug the participant expected compared to the drug(s) actually detected.
 - ADAI and community drug checking sites collaborate on data analysis, interpretation and presentation.





New WA State Law Supports Drug Checking

RCW 69.50.4121 and 2022 c 16 s 92 are each amended to read as follows: 35 (1) Every person who sells ((or gives,)) or permits to be sold ((or given)) to any person any drug paraphernalia in any form commits a class I civil infraction under chapter 7.80 RCW. For purposes of Official Print - 8 5536-S2.E AMH ENGR H1919.E this subsection, "drug paraphernalia" means all equipment, products, and materials of any kind which are used, intended for use, or designed for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, compounding, converting, harvesting, manufacturing, producing, analyzing,)) ((testing, processing, preparing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, injecting, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing into the human body a controlled substance other than cannabis.
